The WVBOM is the sole authority for the issuance of licenses to practice medicine and surgery, to practice podiatry, and to practice as a physician assistant for a medical doctor (M.D.) in the state of West Virginia, and is the regulatory and disciplinary body for medical doctors, podiatrists and their physician assistants.

Protection of the public interest in the practice of medicine, surgery and podiatry.

Board Composition

- Members: 15*
- Committees: 6
- Staff: 16 Administration; Licensing, Certification and Renewals Section; and Investigation and Complaints Section (ICS).
- ICS: 2 Investigators, Paralegal, Complaints Coordinator and 2 Attorneys

Statutory Authority

- WV Code Chapter 29A State Administrative Procedures Act (administrative code, not criminal)
- WV Code Chapter 30-1 General Provisions for State Boards of Professions and Occupations
- WV Code Chapter 30-3 Medical Practice Act
- WV Code Chapter 30-3A Physician Assistant Practice Act

Statutory Authority

11.1 – 11.6 Confidentiality of Complaint and Investigation Process

Functions

- The licensing of medical doctors (M.D.), podiatric physicians (D.P.M.) and physician assistants (P.A.-C.)
- Issuance of drug dispensing certificates
- Certification of medical corporations and professional limited liability companies (PLLCs)

Functions (cont.)

- Primary source verification of licenses
- Verify continuing medical education (CME)
- Public source for malpractice settlements and judgments
- Disciplinary actions involving M.D.s, D.P.M.s and P.A.s



West Virginia Board of Medicine

Functions (cont.)

- Unauthorized practice of medicine (includes prescribing): referral to prosecuting attorney's office
- Less than 90 days: misdemeanor, up to \$5,000 fine or 12 months in jail, or both
- More than 90 days: felony, up to \$10,000 fine or 1-5 years in jail, or both

Areas of Discipline

- Standard of care
- Professional incompetence
- Exercising influence within a patient-physician relationship for the purpose of engaging a patient in sexual activity
- Prescribing, dispensing, administering or otherwise preparing a prescription drug, including any controlled substance, other than in good faith and in a therapeutic manner in the course of professional practice

Areas of Discipline (cont.)

- Failure to keep written records to justify the course of treatment of the patient
- Gross negligence in the use and control of prescription forms
- Unprofessional conduct

2016

- Active licenses in West Virginia:
 M.D. 6,190 / 4,035
 D.P.M. 107 / 76
 P.A.-C. 824 / 753
- 172 complaints filed with the Board of Medicine (M.D. - 158; D.P.M. - 5; P.A.-C - 9)
- 4 were drug / impairment related



West Virginia Board of Medicine

Complaint Process

- Written complaint, completed on WVBOM complaint form, or a written report from a 3rd party, reviewed by Complaint Committee
- Complaints reviewed by Executive Director, Attorney and Supervisor of Investigation and Complaints to determine jurisdiction
- Letter of acknowledgement to complainant explaining necessity for confidentiality
- Letter to licensee requesting response to complaint



Complaint Process (cont.)

- Response of licensee received
- Licensee response forwarded to complainant for reply
- Case file placed on agenda of Complaint Committee for review
- After review, the committee may proceed in one of the following ways:

Complaint Process (cont.)

- No probable cause:
 - ➤Case is closed
 - Closure decision and letter sent to complainant and licensee
- Probable cause:
 - Consent order signed by licensee; or
 - Formal hearing

Formal Hearing

- Licensee served with a Complaint and Notice of Hearing
- Hearing held before a Hearing Examiner
- Hearing Examiner's recommendation and transcript with exhibits reviewed by the Board, which determines (minus Complaint Committee):


Formal Hearing Outcomes

- Dismissal of charges
- Imposition of conditions of practice
- Reprimand
- Fine
- Community service
- Order of Suspension, Revocation or Probation issued

Prescription Drug Diversion

- Any criminal act involving a prescription drug
- The acquisition of prescription drugs for other than their medically intended use (recreation, profit, addiction)
- An issue of medical practice for more than a century



West Virginia Board of Medicine

Prescription Drug Diversion

- Commonly abused Rx drugs:
 - ➤Amphetamines Dexedrine, Adderall, Ritalin
 - ➢ Barbiturates Seconal, Phenobarbital
 - Tranquilizers Valium, Xanax, Ativan, Ambien, Lunesta
 - Opiates Oxycontin, Vicodin, Percodan, Percocet, Norco

How Physicians Fall Prey The 5 Ds

- Dishonesty Knowingly prescribes for profit, sex or self
- Disability Impaired by their own alcohol or chemical abuse or dependence, or by mental or physical illness
- Duped Goes along with increased amounts or changes
- Dated Not keeping pace with developments in pharmacology
- Distracted Overscheduled, inattentive to patient and/or support staff, careless Rx writing, poor medical record practices

Assessing a Physician's Practice

- Thorough examinations and evaluations
- Sound treatment plans
- Informed consent and agreements (drug contracts)
- Periodic review of treatment and progress
- Use of consultation when necessary
- Accurate medical records



West Virginia Board of Medicine

Assessing a Physician's Practice (cont.)

- Use of drug screens (UDS)
- Use of pill counts
- Security of Rx pads or electronic Rx
- Use of Controlled Substances Monitoring Program
- Patient discharge for violating drug contracts

Strategies to Consider

- Interagency collaboration
- Distinguishing between criminal behavior and medical negligence
- Access to medical experts
- Balancing publicity
- Controlled Substances Monitoring Program
- Education
